1652

In about this year, John Melvin (1) was born in Fife, Scotland. He would get married with Hannah Lewis, daughter of John Lewis and Mary Browne Lewis, born in about 1655. He would be a "Taylor" in Charlestown MA and a private under Captain Joseph Sill in the company that in 1676 would march to Packchouge and camp for the night in a large wigwam. In 1681 he would purchase a house in Charlestown for £38. In 1684, John Melvin (1) and Robert Melvin would each be paying the first rate as members of the Scots Charitable Society of Boston (1st charitable organization in New England). Hannah Lewis Melvin would die on May 23 (27?), 1696 at the age of 41 in Charlestown after bearing seven surviving children and then John Melvin (1) would promptly remarry, with Margaret Shamesbury in Boston, and produce two more children. John Melvin (1) would die on August 21, 1726 in Concord.

THE MELVINS OF CONCORD

In Concord, Simon Willard was again deputy and representative to the General Court.

In the previous year <u>Simon Willard</u> had gotten married for the 2d time, with Elizabeth Dunster, possibly in England, but she had quickly died. This year he got married for the 3d time, with Mary Dunster (December 1630-December 1715), not his 2d wife's sister but a daughter of Robert Dunster and Mary Gerrett Dunster of Concord, in Lancaster in the Massachusetts Bay Colony.

- Jonathan Willard, born on December 14, 1669, who would not survive.
- Elizabeth Willard, who would not survive.
- Dorothy Willard, who would not survive.

In 1724 Jonathan Melvin (1) would purchase a strip of land adjoining the farm of Sarah's brother John Hartwell in Concord. Jonathan Melvin (1) would die on February 11, 1736 in Concord, bequeathing his sword to his fourth son and a gun to each of his sons John Melvin (2) and Jonathan Melvin (2).

June 23, Saturday (Old Style): Sarah Melvin was born in <u>Concord</u> to Jonathan Melvin (1) and Sarah Hartwell Melvin. In 1735/1736 she would get married with Joseph Barns; in a brief period they would have 6 children. In 1740, as a widow, she would come to be the owner of a slave.

In 1744 John Melvin (3) and his brother-in-law Joseph Barnes would sell 6 acres of land in Acton MA and relocate to Hollis NH, but then soon return to Concord.

February 11, Wednesday (1735, Old Style): Jonathan Melvin (1) died in <u>Concord</u>, bequeathing his sword to his fourth son and a gun to each of his sons John Melvin (3) and Jonathan Melvin (2).

THE MELVINS OF CONCORD

Note that according to the history of Concord published in 1835 by <u>Lemuel Shattuck</u> (<u>A HISTORY OF THE TOWN OF CONCORD</u>;...), at this point nothing of any great importance had happened in Concord for half a century:

During the fifty subsequent years few important events mark the history of the town. The generation who first emigrated from England had nearly all departed, and others taken their places; but with habits and education somewhat different from their fathers and peculiar to their own period. Compelled to labor hard to supply their own necessities, parents had little time or ability to educate their children and the people generally were, in consequence, less enlightened than the first settlers. More signed legal instruments by their marks at this than at any other period. Their history (and such is the history of the country generally) exhibits this as the dark age of New England. Superstition and supposed witchcraft now prevailed. Concord, however, was not a bewitched town; it never took a part in that horrible delusion. The increase in numbers, wealth and intellectual improvement of the people, was subsequently slow but progressive.

1740

April 22, Tuesday (Old Style): This would be a day of note, later, for a baby in <u>Concord</u> whom they were at this point deciding to call not Violet but Nancy for the duration of her natural life. She was to be one of 21 persons of such status in Concord:

Know all men by these presents that I, William Wilson of Concord in the County of Midd. x in New England Gen. t - for the sum of Thirty Pounds to me secured and payed [sic] by Sarah Melvin of Said Concord, Widow. Do hereby fully and absolutely Sell, Grant, Convey and Passover to said Sarah Melvin, her heirs and assigns for ever a certain Negro girl being a slave about two-years of age called <del>Violet</del>Nancy to be to her, her heirs and Assigns, for her and their use and Service, During the said Negro girls natural life. Hereby for myself, heirs Execut. rs and Admin. rs Warranting her said Negro girl to her Said Sarah Melvin, her heirs and Assigns from the legal claims or Demands of any person.

In <u>Concord</u>, Samuel Heywood, Joseph Wright, John Jones, Ephraim Jones, and Nathaniel Whittemore were Selectmen.

In Concord, Samuel Heywood was again Town Clerk.

Ephraim Jones was Concord's deputy and representative to the General Court.

John Melvin (3) and Hannah Heald got married in Concord. The couple would have 8 children.



# OF CONCORD, MASSACHUSETTS

1746

August 4, Monday (Old Style): Hannah Melvin was born in <u>Concord</u> to John Melvin (3) and Hannah Heald Melvin. She would not be baptized in her infancy, as these Melvins were not church people and consequently were not being permitted to offer their offspring for baptism.



# OF CONCORD, MASSACHUSETTS

1748

May 13, Friday-31, Tuesday (Old Style): Captain Eleazer Melvin of <u>Concord</u> (June 28, 1703-October 18, 1754) kept a diary during a march into the wilderness toward Lake Champlain's Crown Point.

THE MELVINS OF CONCORD

November 23, Wednesday (Old Style): Sarah Melvin was born in <u>Concord</u> to John Melvin (3) and Hannah Heald Melvin. She would get married with Jonathan Smith (or Davis) in Worcester in 1769 and the couple would live in Westminster.



## OF CONCORD, MASSACHUSETTS

1751

June 15, Saturday (Old Style): Amos Melvin (2) was born in Concord to John Melvin (3) and Hannah Heald Melvin. Amos would get married with Anna Flatt, who was born in about 1763, daughter of Mr. Flatt and Ann Beaton. As the Minuteman on guard at the courthouse at 2AM on April 19, 1775, when Dr. Prescott arrived to sound the alarm that the British Army was on the march and heading their way, Amos Melvin (2) rang the meetinghouse bell. Since his name is on the list of "6 weeks men" for December 1775/January 1776, he was among the men forming the first guard at Cambridge. In 1777 he and others conveyed stores to Boston, returning to Concord with the empty wagons. Amos Melvin (2) would die in Concord on August 13, 1806.

1754

February 11, Monday: Sibill Melvin was born in <u>Concord</u> to John Melvin (3) and Hannah Heald Melvin. She would die on August 11, 1770.

THE MELVINS OF CONCORD

October 18, Friday: Eleazer Melvin of Concord died.

THE MELVINS OF CONCORD

Mr. Melvin died October 18, 1754 aged 52. He was son of John Melvin, who died 1724 aged 74. Grandchildren of his are now [1835] living.<sup>3</sup>

# OF CONCORD, MASSACHUSETTS

1756

May 17, Monday: Mary Melvin was born in <u>Concord</u> to John Melvin (3) and Hannah Heald Melvin. She would get married with a Mr. Rice and move to Ashby, Massachusetts.

THE MELVINS OF CONCORD

The beginning of the Seven Year War (1756-1763), with Britain declaring war on France. Most of the European powers would become involved.

June 7, Monday: Eunice Melvin was born in <u>Concord</u> to John Melvin (3) and Hannah Heald Melvin. In 1789 she would get married with Joseph Polly of Fitchburg.



### OF CONCORD, MASSACHUSETTS



In <u>Concord</u>, Samuel Merriam, James Chandler, John Flint, Stephen Hosmer, Jr., and Jonas Heywood were Selectmen.

In Concord, John Beaton continued as Town Treasurer.

Charles Prescott was Concord's deputy and representative to the General Court.

At the age of about 12 or 13, Hannah Melvin of <u>Concord</u>, having experienced religious conversion, was accepted into the church.

THE MELVINS OF CONCORD

Due to the religious upheaval in <u>Concord</u> involving his family, the first marriage of Charles Miles in 1756 had been officiated at by a Justice of the Peace rather than the local minister, but in this year, having reconciled with the church, his second marriage was officiated at by the Reverend Daniel Bliss.

James Minott of <u>Concord</u> was an Assistant and Counselor. James Minot, Jr. died, and left his "dwelling house, barns and all of the other buildings on the home lot [in <u>Concord</u>] to my son Ephraim" Minot.

Hannah Melvin, age about 28 or 29, was suspected, while in the <u>Concord</u> jail for some offense (this was the wooden Concord jail of the time, not the stone Middlesex jail of a later era), of having engaged in a promiscuous act of sexual congress. She was admonished before the congregation of the church by the Reverend <u>William Emerson</u>, and informed that she would no longer be eligible to take Communion. Hannah responded by denying all the charges against her, and making counteraccusations against the Reverend Emerson and against Harvard student <u>Ezra Ripley</u>. Note that in the story about student Ezra Ripley being

accused by Hannah Melvin, there is no hint that her accusation was either personal or sexual. It may well have been merely that one of her bed partners had informed her that student Ezra had been with the carousing students who, recently, while on their way from the Concord tavern to their lodgings late one night, had had some collegial fun by breaking windows with roadside pebbles. I have lost my source for this story about student Ezra being accused by Hannah. Possible sources include:

April 19, Wednesday, 1:30AM on this morning: The oldest son of Ephraim Hartwell (1) and Elizabeth Heywood Hartwell, Samuel Hartwell (4), was residing alongside his father Ephraim Hartwell (1) in the grandfather's 1690s homestead in Concord, with a wife Mary Hartwell (4) and three young daughters. He and his brother John Hartwell (5) had joined the Lincoln Minute Company and been elected sergeants, serving under their neighbor, Captain William Smith. Their brother Isaac Hartwell (2) was a private in this unit. At about 1:30AM on this morning, Dr. Samuel Prescott was hammering on Samuel Hartwell (4)'s door and announcing that the British Regular Army was on the road to Concord. While the husband and his brothers dashed to muster, while Mary Hartwell (4) handed her 4-month-old Lucy Hartwell to a servant woman and ran through the night to Captain William Smith's house to pass on the alarm. She then took refuge at her father's home. Samuel Hartwell (4), John Hartwell (5), and Isaac Hartwell (2) (and, possibly, brother Jonas Hartwell with the Lincoln militia) would be part of the stand at North Bridge. Brother Ephraim Hartwell (3) responded to the alarm as a private in the militia of Princeton MA. The Hartwell brothers would serve various lengths of time in the American army, with Samuel Hartwell (4) becoming a Regimental Quartermaster at the Battle of White Plains, John Hartwell (5) becoming a company captain, and Isaac Hartwell (2) and Jonas Hartwell serving as sergeants under him.

As the Minuteman on guard at the courthouse at 2AM when Dr. Prescott arrived in <u>Concord</u> center to sound the alarm that the British Army was on the march and heading their way, it was Amos Melvin (2) who rang the meetinghouse bell.

October 4, Wednesday: The Reverend <u>Asa Dunbar</u> recorded in his journal: "Josiah Jones broke out of Concord goal [sic]."

The <u>Harvard College</u> students (about 143) and faculty (about 10) gathered in <u>Concord</u>. The average age of the 26 members of the freshman class was 15, so some problems of student high spirits were going to need to be carefully managed, and in particular village girls such as Hannah Melvin were going to need to be carefully chaperoned. President Samuel Langdon arranged to reside at the home of Dr. Timothy Minott, on the site that later would be occupied by the Middlesex Hotel (which is now the park at the town square). Professor Sewell arranged to reside at the home of James Jones, in what is known as the "Bullet Hole" house. Professor Wigglesworth arranged to reside with the Bates's and the Andersons near the present intersection of Old Bedford Road with Bedford Street. Dr. and Mrs. John Winthrop arranged to reside with the Whitneys at their home that would become the plot for "The Wayside" (or, possibly, at the home of Captain Stones west of Hildreth Corner on Barrett's Mill Road, house number 222). The college's scientific apparatuses remained with Dr. Winthrop. The College library was unpacked in the home of Humphrey Barrett on Monument Road halfway between the Manse and the town square. Some of the students arranged for their lodging at local taverns and some arranged to be welcomed into local private homes. For instance, Dr. Joseph Lee of 38 Willard Road hosted 12 of the students including his own son Samuel ('76). The Willard Farm area is now presumed to have been a focal point for college activities, but class recitations were held at the court house, the meeting house, and the empty grammar school at the town center. Harvard's quite unique College Clock was put on public display, and its college fire engine was made available for general town fire protection.

The buildings of <u>Harvard</u> were occupied as barracks for the American army, while stationed at Cambridge, and the students were dispersed. The college was removed to <u>Concord</u> and commenced its operations on the first of October, 1775. President Langdon lived at Dr. Minot's (now [1835] the Middlesex Hotel); Professor Sewall lived at James Jones's; Professor Wigglesworth at the Bates place on the Bedford road; and Professor Winthrop at Darius Merriam's, near which was the library and philosophical apparatus; and other officers in different parts of the town

7. Dr. Joseph Lee (June 16, 1716-April 10, 1797) of Concord kept four volumes of diary entries in his almanacs for years from 1769 into 1794. These amount to scattered short entries of personal affairs and town affairs, and deaths. His son the Reverend Joseph Lee (1742-1819) of Royalston MA also kept such diaries or interleaved almanacs for some years between 1770 and 1783.

Amos Melvin (2) and others of <u>Concord</u> conveyed stores to the revolutionary forces in the vicinity of <u>Boston</u>, returning to Concord with the empty wagons.

Concord's revolutionary Committee of Correspondence, Inspection and Safety was renewed.

David Brown, and Capt. George Minot. In 1777, Colonel John Buttrick, Josiah Merriam, Isaac Hubbard, Capt. Abishai Brown, Capt. David Wheeler, Mr. Ephraim Potter, and Lieut. Nathan Stow. In 1778, John Cuming, Esq., Colonel John Buttrick, Ephraim Wood, Jr., Esq., Jonas Heywood, Esq., James Barrett, Esq., Capt. David Brown, and Mr. Josiah Merriam. These were re-elected in 1779, 1780, 1781 & 1782. In 1783, James Barrett, Esq., Jonas Heywood, Esq., Ephraim Wood, Jr., Esq., Capt. David Wood, and Lieut.

Joseph Hayward. This committee was not chosen afterwards. <sup>10</sup> A committee also attempted to set prices:

[A] committee, chosen by the town for the purpose, reported the prices of various kinds of "common labor, carpenters', cordwainers', blacksmiths' women's labor, firewood, charcoal, live swine, horse-hire, chaise-hire, upper leather, saddlery, entertainment at public houses, flax, spirits, milk, clothiers' work," etc. All who varied from the established prices were prosecuted and treated as enemies. Colonel John Buttrick was chosen to collect evidence against such as might be brought to trial. It does not appear, however, that any prosecutions took place in Concord. 11



Heavy rains in Canada were holding up the grain harvest. To solve the problem of the current cotton glut and consequent disastrously low commodity prices, the Farm Board proposed that cotton farmers plow under every 3d row of their current crop. Meanwhile, Metropolitan Life Insurance Company was considering issuing the largest mortgage ever, for the creation of Rockefeller City on Manhattan Island (MetLife's loan for construction of the Empire State Building had been for \$27,000,000 whereas this one would be for \$65,000,000).

According to Helen E. Glutsch's "Interesting Reminiscences" in the <u>Saturday Review of Literature</u> VIII, page 92, Howard Melvin of <u>Concord</u> had reported to her that:

Thoreau taught me one thing: not to fill my bucket too full. Told me to fetch a bucket of water. When I found it was too heavy to lift out of the well, he wouldn't help me. No, sir, he wouldn't help me. I learned then not to fill my bucket too full. I was only a lad of six or seven then. He always said there were only two naturalists. He was the naturalist, and I was the other one. We used to talk about birds and eggs and things we found in the woods.




