Richard How was born at Aspley-Guise, near Woburn, Bedfordshire, in the year 1727, and died there in the year 1801, aged seventy-four years, and was interred in the Friends' burial-ground at the hamlet vulgarly called Hogstyend, now Woburn Sands. He collected the large and valuable library still preserved by the family at Aspley, in a room built for the purpose.
