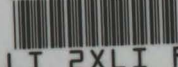

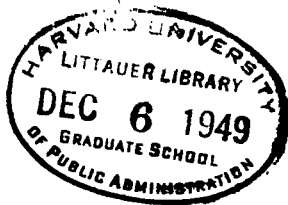

Incorporated September 12, 1635.

ATT the Genall Court holden att Newe Towne, Sept. 2, 1635, It is ordered that there shalbe a Plantacõn att Musketequid, & that there shalbe 6 myles of land square to belong to it, & that the inhabitants thereof shall have three yeares Immunities from all publ charges except traineings; Further that when any that plant there shall have occacõn of carryeing of goods thither, they shall repaire to two of the nexte mgistrates where the teames are, whoe shall have power for a yeare to presse draughts att reasonable rates, to be payde by the owners of the goods, to transport their goods thither att seasonable tymes; & the name of the place is changed, & hereafter to be called,

Beginning at a stone monument that marks the point where the Acton and Concord town line crosses the road from the Massachusetts Reformatory to Wetherbee's Mill; thence south 61° east, about 290 rods to a stone monument upon the northerly side of Barrett's Mill Road, 330 feet easterly from house of Henry H. Qua; thence south 1° west, about 300 rods to a stone monument upon the northerly side of road leading from Concord to Concord Junction, and about 120 feet easterly from a private way leading to house of Jerry Sheehan; thence south 28° west about 328 rods to a stone monument upon the northerly side of road from Concord Junction to Nine Acre Corner and about 150 feet southeasterly from where said road crosses Nut Meadow Brook; thence south 48° west, about 410 rods, to a stone monument that marks the spot where the town line between Sudbury and Concord crosses the old Sudbury Road from Concord, and near the house of Jonathan Dakin in Sudbury; thence south 50° east, following said Concord and Sudbury line about 750 rods, to the middle of Concord River and near Bound Rock (so called), to the bound between Concord and Lincoln; thence following the said Concord and Lincoln bound, in the middle of said river north-

The system of education in Concord has undergone a complete change within the last fifteen years. Prior to 1880 the district schools were attended by the children until they became fitted for the High. In 1880 the School Committee, following the example of the town of Quincy, built an eight-room building—the “Emerson School.” The district schools were closed, and the children transported from the outskirts to the centre. The success of this undertaking was largely due to the indefatigable labor and untiring energy of the Superintendent, Mr. John B. Tileston, now a resident of Milton.

In 1887 a large four-room school building was built at West Concord to accommodate the large number of children in that part of the town; and in 1889 the new High School-house was built, the old building being moved to Hubbard Street, to be used as an overflow for the Emerson School. The total cost of these buildings was in the neighborhood of fifty thousand dollars, and the town annually appropriates from fifteen to twenty thousand dollars for their support. In the winter of 1891 an Evening School was opened for two evenings a week, with an attendance of one hundred. Concord feels a just pride that pupils from her schools enter the colleges and other institutions of learning with honors.

FIRE DEPARTMENT.

The Fire Society was organized May 5, 1794; each member was equipped with two buckets and a bag. The engine company was formed soon after, and a small hand engine procured. In 1827 a volunteer company was organized, and in 1831 sufficient money was raised by subscription to purchase a new engine.

No regular report was made of the department until 1850. At this time the town owned three fire engines, namely, Tiger, No. 1; Lion, No. 2; and Independence, No. 3. At the present time the Fire Department is made up as follows:

This beautiful building was built under the direction of the late William Munroe, and by him presented to the town. It was opened October 1, 1873. It contains at the present time over twenty-four thousand volumes, and the number is being constantly increased. The Reading Room contains, beside the daily papers, every magazine and periodical of note. The Reference Department is a storehouse of information, not the least interesting being the Concord Alcove, which contains a complete set of books written by Concord authors—a veritable library in itself. There are many interesting articles of virtue, works of art, sculpture, relics, historical manuscripts, data, etc., which are both valuable and interesting.

The Library derives its support, in part, by town appropriations, and from the income of funds left for its maintenance by the late William Munroe, and others.

WATER WORKS.

Constructed 1874.

Sandy Pond, situated in the town of Lincoln, is the source of Concord's water supply. The Mill Dam, or centre of the town, is one hundred feet below the level of the pond; consequently a good head is obtained, sufficient to throw the water on to the roof of any building. The water is of singular purity, making it excellent for drinking purposes.

The original cost of the Water Works was \$48,000. The Reservoir on Hurd Hill was built, in 1883, as an additional head for the Massachusetts Reformatory, and also in case of break in main pipe. Up to March 1, 1892, there had been expended \$153,240.82; and twenty-five miles of main pipe have been laid. There are at the present time one hundred and fourteen hydrants, and six hundred takers of the water. The receipts for the year ending March 1, 1892, were \$14,661.64.

THE WEATHER SIGNALS. — Explanation of the weather signals adopted by the United States Weather Bureau :

1. A square white flag indicates clear or fair weather; cloudy weather without rain or snow is included under the head of fair weather.

2. A square blue flag indicates rain or snow.

3. A white and blue flag (parallel bars of white and blue) is used principally during the summer months, and indicates that local rains or showers will occur, and that the rainfall will not be general.

4. A black triangular flag always refers to temperature; when placed above either of the preceding three flags it indicates warmer, and when below either of them, colder weather; when it is not displayed the indications are that the temperature will not vary more than five degrees from the temperature of the same hour of the preceding day.

5. A square white flag with black square in centre indicates the approach of a sudden and decided fall in temperature. This signal is not displayed unless it is expected that the temperature will fall to forty-two degrees, or lower, and is usually ordered at least twenty-four hours in advance of the cold wave.

6. A square red flag with black square in centre indicates that the storm expected will be of marked violence.

The signals are arranged to read downward; thus the white square flag with the triangular black flag above it, and the square blue flag below it, are interpreted fair weather, warmer, followed by rain. FRED A. TOWER, *Displayman*.

The heirs of Mr. John Brown, of Concord, in like manner, handed to the Treasurer of the Home the sum of \$500. The Home occupies a large building on Walden Street, and has at present six in the family, the oldest of whom is ninety-six years old. It is managed by a Board of Officers, consisting of a President, Secretary, Treasurer, Board of Directors, and a Board of Managers.

MANUFACTORIES.

BOSTON HARNESS COMPANY.

The Boston Harness Company began its existence about twelve years ago in a very small way in the city of Boston. It changed hands in 1882, when Mr. Harvey Wheeler, of its present management, bought the entire business. It has gradually developed, so that in April, 1890, it occupied its present quarters at Concord Junction. At that time Mr. R. M. Hoyle took an interest with Mr. Wheeler, and the business has been continued since as a partnership under the same name.

The main building occupied for the business is 180 x 40 feet wide, and two stories high, having boiler and engine room, storeroom and stable, additional. About one hundred and twenty hands are employed, mostly men, on all kinds

of harnesses, except the very cheapest grades. The goods manufactured are sold almost exclusively to the wholesale trade, the yearly output being about 20,000 harnesses. This exceeds the product of any other harness factory in New England. Already the increasing business makes the present quarters inadequate to meet the demands.

Harvey Wheeler is Treasurer and General Manager, and R. M. Hoyle is Assistant Manager.

CONCORD WAGON WORKS.

Established in 1875.

Albert B. Black was the founder of this manufactory, and its proprietor until two years ago, when Amasa Harrington, of Waltham, became a partner, and having recently purchased Mr. Black's interest, is now the sole owner. The plant, situated on Walden Street, comprises a building 80 x 60 feet, four stories in height, and basement, with ample facilities for a manufacturing and jobbing business. The work is confined mostly to the heavier grade of vehicles, from ten to twenty men being constantly employed.

DAMON MANUFACTURING COMPANY.

Chartered in December, 1880.

Concord was one of the first places where water power was utilized, and at the village of Westvale was built the first of the many dams which now develop the power of the Assabet River.

In 1660 a company was chartered to erect iron works there, the dam built, and the business carried on for about thirty years, when the supply of ore was exhausted. A grist mill then occupied a part of the power, and later was added a fulling mill for the finishing of home-woven cloths.

In 1808 Hartwell & Brown's cotton mill began operations, and continued, with several changes in the firm, until

about 1833, when James Derby, of Exeter, N. H., bought it with the purpose of manufacturing cotton and wool machinery. In December, 1834, he sold out the entire property to Calvin C. Damon, then of Saxonville, who began the manufacture of satinets, but soon changed to the well-known and popular "Damon's original domett." This business was continued by him until his death in January, 1854.

Edward C. Damon began to keep the books in November, 1852, and continued the manufacture of dometts, after the death of his father, until the burning of the mill in 1862. The new brick mill began operations in 1863 on dometts. In May, 1864, Henry F. Smith was taken into partnership, and the business was largely increased and diversified by the manufacture of all-wool and shaker flannels. This firm continued until the fall of 1876, and the new firm of Damon & Almy started business the first of December of the same year, and still further diversified and increased the product.

December, 1880, the Damon Manufacturing Company was organized and incorporated. They continued on the same goods with variations for ten years, making many styles of white dress goods, tennis cloths, and piece dyed goods. At present they are devoting their whole attention to the production of cloakings, dress goods, Bedford cords, worsteds, serges, etc. The works are run by water wheels giving one hundred and twenty-five horse power, and an engine of a capacity of one hundred and seventy horse power. The land connected with the establishment is about twenty acres, on which are situated the mill and forty tenements. The number of employees for full capacity is one hundred and seventy-five, and the weekly pay roll is about \$1,300. New York City is the distributing centre for the products. The capital stock of the company is \$120,000. The officers of the corporation are:

PAIL FACTORY.

Established in 1850.

The pail factory at Concord Junction is owned and operated by R. Warner & Co., of Boston. The plant covers a number of acres, and furnishes employment for thirty to thirty-five men. About seven hundred cords of pine timber are yearly made into pails and tubs, which find a ready market in this country and in England.

THE MASSACHUSETTS REFORMATORY.

Elm Street, Concord Junction.

This institution is located in the western part of the town, two and one half miles from the centre, and three fourths of a mile from Concord Junction. It was originally designed and opened in 1878 as a State prison. Within its walls are twenty-three acres of land, upon which is erected this mammoth structure, together with its industrial adjuncts. It was opened as a reformatory, December 20, 1884, and since that date there have been committed to it about five thousand and two hundred persons; and the releases for the same period have been about four thousand and three hundred, of whom about seven eighths were released upon permit.

When opened as a reformatory, one hundred and fifteen men were left from the State prison, and others were transferred from the prison at Charlestown and various houses of correction within the Commonwealth. Subsequently men were sentenced from the different courts of the State with definite sentences, but a subsequent act of the Legislature, which went into effect in July, 1886, provided for indeterminate sentences, and its reformatory effect is marked. The

men now confined have mostly come on these indefinite sentences; and this, with the recent enactment establishing an age limit of forty years, has proved of inestimable value. About seventy-five per cent of those released have done sufficiently well to not again appear before the courts. The present number of inmates is about nine hundred.

Each inmate is carefully examined on his arrival as to his possible attainments and capacity, and is then given a suitable place in the schools. The schools are divided into fifteen classes, and there are nine teachers. Over seven hundred men and boys are in the schools. Some few who are here are educationally advanced, and no classes being suitable for them, they are excused from school work. Industrial teaching is also a valued feature of reformatory instruction. The following trades are taught: blacksmithing, plumbing, printing, tinsmithing, bricklaying, carpentry, wood-turning, engraving, and painting. There are at the present time four hundred and four inmates under trades instruction. There is now under construction an addition to the reformatory, to contain two hundred and thirty-six cells, all the work upon which is to be performed by the industrial school classes. The reformatory buildings are commodious and convenient. They are of brick, with granite trimmings. The entire plant represents an outlay of about \$1,000,000.

In the last annual report of the late Superintendent, Col. Gardiner Tufts, there occurs this truism: "When the State makes the violators of its laws prisoners, it incurs thereby the obligation to educate and train them to good citizenship, and make them competent to earn an honest living. The State is unmindful of its duty and its welfare when it merely holds the offender a prisoner, making no effort to reform the man." In this statement is found the reason for and the necessity of the existence of the reformatory and its work.

CONCORD HOME SCHOOL.

The Concord Home School, a school for boys opened in 1891 and conducted by its founder, Mr. James S. Garland, is one of the "live" institutions of the town. It is situated upon the old Wood estate on the west side of the Sudbury River, and embraces seventy-five acres of beautiful upland, extending westward from the river, between Elm Street on the north, and the Fitchburg Railroad on the south. The new school building stands on the brow of the hill overlooking the river. Behind, stretch away to the westward the

ample playgrounds, many acres in extent. The building is planned upon a generous scale, and admirably arranged and equipped for a family school. It is lighted with gas, and heated with an interchangeable hot water and steam apparatus by indirect radiation. The dormitory is a distinctive feature. The pupils have separate rooms, on the English plan, all opening into one great hall, thus securing proper ventilation and surveillance, and at the same time sufficient privacy. This arrangement has been found most conducive, also, to the intimate family life so desirable in a boarding-school. The Principal and his household are domiciled near by in the ancient house of the Wood family (built in 1760), but take their meals with the scholars at the school, and are in the closest relations of intimacy with them.

The courses of study are such as are commonly pursued in preparatory schools of high grade, but, owing to the small number of scholars, are exceedingly flexible. The particular needs of each pupil are considered, and such studies prescribed as are best suited to each case.

Among the special features may be mentioned careful training in the English language; practical teaching in French and German with a view to give the student facility in speaking and understanding them; thorough courses in Latin and Greek within the limits of preparation for college; and special instruction in mathematics and science, with laboratory practice in physics and chemistry. It is the aim of the school to prepare such pupils as intend to take a college course for as early entrance as possible, by a judicious shaping of the course of study.

Sufficient but not undue attention is given to athletics. The well-equipped gymnasium offers every facility for exercise when inclemency of weather prevents activity in the open air, but the lawn tennis courts and ball fields offer the most useful and popular forms of recreation on land. Land sports, however, are not the only ones which the student at Concord has at his command. The river, which forms the eastern boundary of the school grounds, possesses unrivaled

attractions for lovers of the water. The Concord and its two branches, the Sudbury and Assabet, furnish together nearly forty miles of smooth water for canoes and small boats. The school has a large new boathouse, already well stocked with canoes, which on any pleasant afternoon after school hours may be seen cleaving the shining waters as they speed up or down the placid stream.

In short, it is an ideal school in an ideal place, and the fortunate youth who are received under its hospitable roof may well be envied their unrivaled opportunities for pleasure and improvement. The number of pupils now admitted is limited to twenty-five, but the demand for places is so great that an enlargement of its capacity will have to be made in the near future.

In 1887 the town built the new Armory building on Walden Street, at a cost of sixty-seven hundred dollars. John H. Chapman was the architect, and A. S. Lowden the contractor. The main, or head house, is 51 x 26 feet, two stories in height, and contains reading and recreation rooms, coat and equipment room, officers' and non-commissioned officers' room and lavatory. Adjoining and connected is the drill shed, a one-story structure 60 x 49 feet, with natural wood finish. The building is complete in its appointments, and is pronounced by military experts as one of the best in the State.

WHAT TO SEE, AND HOW TO SEE IT.

The tourist who reaches Concord via the railroads is not favorably impressed by his first sight of the town; nor is it to be wondered at that a visitor's first view is disappointing, for the stations are unattractive, plain buildings, and built in the least pleasant parts of the village; but a short walk soon opens up an altogether different vista, as one comes on to the broad streets, beautifully kept, and shaded by wide-spreading elms or fine maples. As many visitors drive to Concord, and as the centre, or Mill Dam, is about equal distance from the stations, we will make this our objective, or rather starting point, in "What to See, and How to See It."

In the centre of the town, at Monument Square, is an oval-shaped Common shut in by an iron rail fence, crossed by walks only. In the centre of this greensward stands a granite shaft, erected to the memory of the Concord heroes of the War of the Rebellion. To read its long list of names on the bronze tablet shows that the town's traditional patriotism has been handed down from sire to son. Monument Street begins at the extreme end of this little Common, and, as the guideboard says, leads to the Battle Ground, a half mile beyond. In traversing this distance the old Jones house, now the residence of Judge John S. Keyes, is passed. It is a quaint structure, low-studded, with a long ell adjoining. Near the front door of this ell can still be seen the bullet-hole made by a British soldier at the time of the Concord fight. By the threshold is a good-sized boulder that once lay on the battle field, and on which Captain Davis, of Acton, fell, mortally wounded by the first volley fired by the red coats. On the opposite side of the road, a little beyond, stands the "Old Manse." A line of ash, elm, and maple trees borders the driveway to this ancient and dignified dwelling. For generations it was the abode of the ministers of the town, being built for the Rev. William Emerson about

1765, and from its windows the inmates watched the fight at the bridge. Hawthorne lived here for a short time, and here wrote his *Mosses from an Old Manse*.

It is but a few steps to the Battle Ground, a quiet, romantic spot now, in marked contrast to the thrilling scenes here enacted in 1775. Stately pines shade the well-worn driveway, many of which were planted by the townspeople fifty or more years ago. The first monument, of granite, was erected in 1836. To the left is a small enclosure containing graves of British soldiers. The bridge was restored in 1874, and on the opposite bank of the river stands the beautiful statue of the "Minute Man," justly considered the finest piece of bronze in America; of additional pride to every inhabitant of the town because it is the work of a Concord boy, Daniel C. French, now a world-renowned sculptor, at the present time a resident of New York.

The green meadows and hills one sees are hallowed ground, for here was struck the first blow for our freedom and independence. Retracing our steps over the same ground over which the British retreated in 1775, we return almost to our first starting point, turning sharply to the left up a short road which brings us on Bedford Street. Our destination now is Sleepy Hollow Cemetery, only a short distance away. Here one can easily find by the well-worn paths the graves of Emerson, Hawthorne, Thoreau, the Alcotts, and others of note in the great circle of literary genius that have helped make this town so famous. The cemetery is an ideal one in its many natural beauties. Returning to the square, or centre, we turn to the left down Lexington Road, stopping first for a look at the old Hill Burying-ground, with its many curious epitaphs, where rest the remains of the old ministers and Revolutionary heroes of the town. A slate tablet set in the wall is self-explanatory. Just across the street stands the Old Wright Tavern, where Major Pitcairn stirred his brandy with bloody finger on the morning of the 19th of April, 1775, with the remark that "he would stir the damned Yankee's blood before night."

A little beyond and in the same grounds stands the old Meeting-House of former days, now remodeled and modernized, noted chiefly because the first Provincial Congress met here on the 11th day of October, 1774. Continuing down the road we pass a number of quaint old houses that have stood here for more than a century. A swinging sign, like the Ancient Tavern-hanger, attracts our attention to the old house containing that wonderful collection of antiquities, etc., the property of the Concord Antiquarian Society. The public can see this collection on payment of twenty-five cents to the Custodian. A short distance beyond, at the junction of the Cambridge Turnpike and the Lexington Road, is the home of Emerson, still the residence of the family. The next place of interest on Lexington Road is the farm of the late John B. Moore, one of the leading horticulturists of New England. The farm is a model one, the present owner, Mr. John H. Moore, keeping it fully up to the high standard his father set. The "Orchard House" and "Hillside Chapel," for many years the home of the Alcotts, adjoin this farm. The School of Philosophy met here during its brief but brilliant career. "Wayside," once the home of Hawthorne, follows in line, an interesting structure with beautiful surroundings of woods. A little further down the road we come to the home of Hon. E. W. Bull, the originator of the "Concord Grape," and where can be seen the great horticulturist, and the parent vine. An eighth of a mile beyond, at the junction of Old Bedford and Lexington Roads, is Merriam's Corner, where the British were attacked in flank by the Minute Men in 1775. A stone, properly inscribed, is set in the wall to mark the spot. We retrace our steps again to the centre, turning the corner by the "Wright Tavern," and are now on Main Street. The first building of interest is the low white house just beyond the bank building. It is probably the oldest house in Concord, being built for a block house in 1654. Many of the original timbers and logs form a part of the present structure. Just beyond is an old burying-ground, one of the seven

oldest in the United States, which contains many interesting epitaphs and the graves of a few of the early patriots. The Concord Free Public Library comes now in view, occupying a prominent position at the junction of Main Street and Sudbury Road. It is a beautiful building of brick and stone, a gift to the town by a townsman, Mr. William Munroe. It contains, beside a large and complete library, many interesting and historical objects. From the library steps, looking across Sudbury Road to Stow Street, an excellent view is obtained of the substantial and attractive public school buildings. Continuing up Main Street, we pass in quick succession the Munroe and Wheildon estates on the left, and the residences of Samuel Hoar and the Hon. E. Rockwood Hoar on the right. A short distance beyond on the left-hand side of the street we see the Thoreau house, once owned by that family, now the property of the Alcott family, and the last Concord residence of the late Louisa M. Alcott. Continuing up the street to a fork in the road, keeping to the right, we are on Elm Street, which passes the pretty little stone Episcopal Church, and a little further on, on the opposite side of the street, the colonial residence of Frank B. Sanborn, the well-known author and journalist. Passing over the bridge, on the right is the famous Lee farm, its first owner being Simon Willard, one of the founders of the town. A stone panel at the side of the road tells us of this fact. At the crown of this hill we turn sharply to the left on Wood Street, which brings us again on to Main Street, passing on the right the fine buildings of the Concord Home School. Returning, one can reach the Fitchburg Station by Thoreau Street, which leads off of Main Street; or the Lowell Station, by continuing to the centre of the town and thence down Lowell Road.

The route as laid out can easily be gone over by carriage in a half day, but a longer time could be spent to advantage. By referring to page 124, a list of "Places of Interest" by streets can be studied with profit.

HISTORICAL TABLETS.

On a panel cut in Egg Rock at the junction of the rivers:

On the hill Nashawtuck
at the meeting of the rivers
and along the banks
lived the Indian owners of
Musketaquid
before the white man came.

On a slate in the wall of the Hill Burying-ground:

On this Hill
the settlers of Concord
built their meeting house
near which they were buried
on the southern slope of the ridge
were their dwellings during
the first winter
below it they laid out
their first road and
on the summit stood the
liberty pole of the Revolution.

On a bronze plate set in granite on Lowell Road, near Square:

Here in the house of the
REVEREND PETER BULKELEY
first minister and one of the
founders of this town
a bargain was made with the
Squaw Sachem the Sagamore Tahattawan
and other Indians
who then sold their right in
the six miles square called Concord
to the English planters
and gave them peaceful possession
of the land
A. D. 1636.

On a panel in a stone west of the Three-Arch Bridge:

On this farm dwelt
SIMON WILLARD
one of the founders of Concord
who did good service for
Town and Colony
for more than forty years.

On a bronze plate set in granite on west side of the Square :

Near this spot stood
the first town house
used for town meetings
and the county courts
1721-1794.

On a stone by the road northwest of the Minute Man :

On this field
the Minute Men and Militia
formed before marching
down to the
fight at the Bridge.

On a stone at the junction of the Old Bedford and
Lexington Roads (Merriam's Corner):

The British troops
retreating from the
Old North Bridge
were here attacked in flank
by the men of Concord
and neighboring towns
and driven under a hot fire
to Charlestown.

On a bronze plate set in granite near the sidewalk on
grounds of the First Parish :

THE FIRST PROVINCIAL CONGRESS

of delegates from the towns of
MASSACHUSETTS
was called by conventions of
the people to meet at Concord on the
eleventh day of October 1774.

The delegates assembled here
in the meeting house on that day,
and organized
with John Hancock as President
and Benjamin Lincoln as Secretary.

Called together to maintain
the rights of the people,
THIS CONGRESS
assumed the government of the province
and by its measures prepared the way
for the war of the Revolution.

Lexington Road — Catholic Church; Hill Burying-ground; Wright Tavern; Old Meeting House (First Parish Church); Historical Tablets; Antiquarian Collection; Old Beaton House (residence of Hon. Geo. Heywood); Old Minott House (property of Hon. Geo. Heywood); home of Emerson; the Moore Farm; Hillside Chapel (School of Philosophy building); Orchard House (home of the Alcotts); Wayside (Hawthorne's home); home of E. W. Bull, Concord Grape (the parent vine); Historical Tablet (Merriam's Corner).

Liberty Street — House of Major John Buttrick, 1775 (residence of Joseph Derby); Battle Lawn (residence of E. S. Barrett); Historical Tablet.

Lowell Road — Historical Tablet; home of the late Dr. Josiah Bartlett.

Main Street — Old Block House, 1654 (known as the Dr. Barrett House); Old Burying-ground; Public Library Building; home of Thoreau (property of the Alcott family); residence of Hon. E. Rockwood Hoar.

Middle Street — Thoreau's Academy (residence of Charles Emerson).

Monument Square—Soldiers' Monument; Catholic Church; Town Hall; Court House (property of Middlesex Mutual Fire Insurance Co.); Historical Tablet.

Monument Street — House of Elisha Jones, 1775 (residence of Hon. J. S. Keyes); Old Manse (residence of Miss Ripley); Battle Ground, 1775; Minute Man Statue, etc.

Nashawtuc Avenue — Reservoir; Willard Common.

Stow Street — Public School Buildings.

Sudbury Road — Residence of Judge George M. Brooks; studio of Daniel C. French.

Walden Street — Armory Building; Trinitarian Church; Concord's Home for the Aged; Walden Pond; Thoreau's Cove, and site of Thoreau's Hut.

Wood Street — Concord Home School Buildings.

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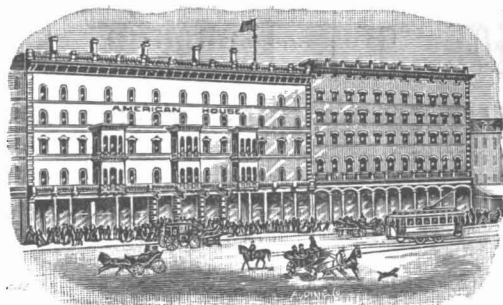
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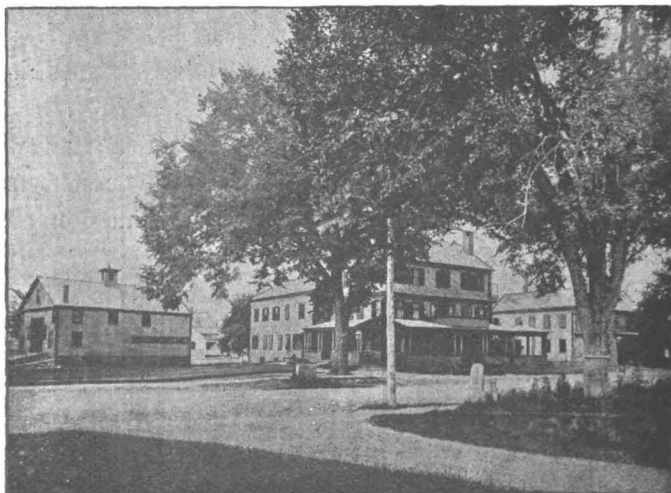
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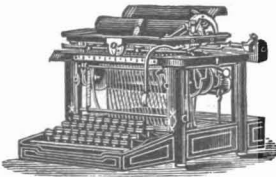
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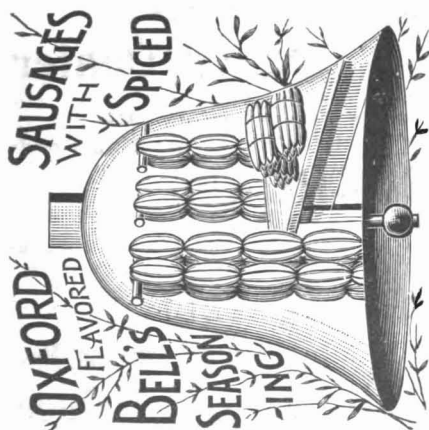
